### He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!

It was wonderful to be able to worship with my faith friends and family this past Easter Resurrection Sunday! It's always a joy to sing praises, lift prayers, and celebrate the faith we have in our Risen Lord. This Easter was no different as we brought the light of Christ back into the worship space after it was extinguished with the observance of Good Friday.



This idea of the return of the light, is in fact, a centering idea of Easter and the Resurrection. In the Gospel According to John, Christ is the Light of the World. In the evangelist's telling of the life of Jesus, Jesus just keeps getting brighter (metaphorically). No one can hide from that brightness. Jesus' light becomes so bright, cultures from outside of Judah are attracted to it.

Then suddenly, it is snuffed out... Or so those in power thought.

Jesus' light is no ordinary light. It is the Light of Life. It is a light whose source is in the eternal flame of God's love. It is the Light of all Hope for a better world in a realized kin-dom. It is a light that, no matter how often it is seemingly extinguished, will always reignite and shine brighter.

This is the definition of living into a Resurrection life. We always keep that flame of love and hope burning. When we see it dimming or even going out in the hearts of the people around us, we act. As Christ followers, we move in body to stoke the flames within each other's hearts so as to live the message of the Gospel.

We'll listen for the voice of the Good Shepherd so our hope might be relit amongst the voices of strife and division. We'll hear the Good News again and again.

Yet, this retelling of the stories of faith, and rekindling of hope does not come through just words and worship. We too are called to be light; fire ignited by the Light of Christ, to go forward and spread the hope of Jesus' truth among the community. That is a message best preached with less words and more action. So, we will also be looking at the ways we as followers of Christ walk the walk as well as pray the prayers.

I look forward to this Easter Season with you, walking in the Resurrection Light of Christ!
